

Introducing a shuffle



- You want to use swing time, like playing in 12/8 or using triplets
- You can make a shuffle with the 5^{th} , 6^{th} and $b7^{th}$ intervals.
- You can also shuffle between the D5 and D6, you don't need to add the flat $7^{\rm th}$ interval.

Adding a turnaround




- These are measures 11 and 12
- The turnaround is a descending line that starts on the 5th interval.
- The hammer on goes from the b3rd to the major 3rd.
- The mute and the up strum on the & after gives the turnaround a nice element of surprise. Changing chords on the & always adds interest.

Turnaround 2



- This turnaround is the same idea, the only difference is the descending line uses $8^{\,\mathrm{ths}}$ instead of $\frac{1}{4}$ tones.

D Minor Pentatonic and D Blues Scale



- Shape 1 of both the D minor pentatonic and the D blues scale, note there is literally just a 1 note difference, the flat 5th, make sure you use that note as a passing tone.

One measure lick



- This puts the scale in play with a one measure fill.
- You can literally use this anywhere you want, just make sure that you don't add it and make a 13 bar blues
- Pay attention to the timing
- Note how the last note is D, this means it resolves on the root note
